When I was a child in the 1950s probably the majority of the local townspeople, graziers and farmers where I grew up in Southern Queensland were of Irish descent, and my father certainly made sure we knew we were Irish.

My mother was of Scottish and German descent and she made sure we knew we were Scottish and German! She used to teach us the Gaelic words for red, black, brown, white, lake and so on, and tell us stories and sing songs, as did my father.

So I grew up knowing that there was a Gaelic heritage, and from quite early on I decided I would learn Gaelic. Over the years I looked at courses at the CAE and other organisations but it was never the right time.

However, two years ago I went to Ireland for the first time and when I came back I embarked on Irish Studies at Melbourne University. I saw a copy of Táin in the bookshop at Trades Hall, bought it, and found the nformation about the Irish classes at East Melbourne.

So I enrolled, as an absolute beginner. My teacher was Chris Mooney and we began to learn the basics with the occasional venture into a bit of history or local culture and customs.

The language is not easy, as, for an English speaker, the pronunciation can be a bit hard to relate to the spelling at the beginning! The grammatical aspects didn't worry me as we weren't learning that way anyway, and because I had grammar drummed into me as a kid, and have learnt other languages, the framework of Irish made sense to me.

But just as I was starting to get into it, university second semester started and I had to give Irish up - timetable clash!

However, I will be back next year. Go raibh maith agat to everyone at Cumann Gaeilge na hAstráile.
